This poem was probably issued after September 1844 when Santa Anna was again driven from the presidency and was trying to regain power. It threatens Santa Anna in strong language: "If Santa Anna wants to attack with his rebellious tyrants, it will end in his destruction and the fire will have to burn..." The poem states that all of Guanajuato and the residents of Leon are behind "beloved Paredes, our valiant defender." A rare Leon imprint, at that time a small provincial city.
